Heroes of the 1995 ABHP Exam

A new record has been set. The year 1995 produced the largest number of applicants and candidates for the American Board of Health Physics Certification exam that we have ever seen. Of the 674 applicants, 303 took Part I exams, and 193 took Part II exams.

First I would like to recognize the hard work of the Exam Site Selection Committee, who went beyond the call of duty in arranging for locations for the exam. The Committee is comprised of Bob Lorenz (Chair), Stephen Duce, and Paul Szalinski. These three individuals were solely responsible for assuring that the exam locations were conveniently accessible to the applicants, that the rooms and facilities were appropriate, and that the potential for snags was sufficiently low so that candidates would not be additionally stressed. I am confident that Bob wishes to receive any feedback candidates may have on the success of the Committee's efforts.

In addition to selecting exam sites, the Committee was also responsible for arranging for proctors for each location. The proctors are responsible for checking in each candidate, confirming identities, determining the suitability of any calculators that are brought into the exam room, monitoring the progress of the exam, maintaining exam security, and ensuring that completed exams are safely delivered to the Executive Secretary's office. They also do what they can-within limits, of course!--to make those hours as easy as possible for the candidates (i.e., replacing pencils, monitoring time, escorting to restrooms and water fountains). Proposed Changes to the Academy's Bylaws

You have been hearing a lot recently about possible changes to the Academy's Bylaws to incorporate a new code of ethics for the practicing CHP. The Executive Committee is working on a brisk schedule to bring this issue to a membership ballot shortly after the Scottsdale meeting. There are two other equally important sets of changes to the Bylaws that will be proposed at the same time. The first set reflects the evolving relationship between the AAHP and the ABHP and the deincorporation of the ABHP. The second set is wordsmithing for improved clarity.

When you receive your ballot in the spring, you will be asked to vote on the three sets of changes independently. This type of balloting will prevent rejection of one or more of the sets of changes due to membership concerns about the third.

Since the scope of all of the proposed Bylaw changes will be significant, the Executive Committee will attempt to make the ballot as user friendly as possible. However, be prepared to do some careful reading when it arrives in the mail. And, please vote.
